Letter from the **Executive Director**

l remember reading those words during one of my first meetings with the Board and thought, What a great catchphrase. Now

I understand that it's much more than catchphrase or a good marketing tool, it's who we are and what we do.

When I arrived in November of 2021 we were still at the height of the pandemic. The Chamber Ensemble was on hiatus, we canceled one of our scheduled Holiday Concerts and our after-school choirs were unable to rehearse. While all of this was disheartening, we did have wonderful successes. Over 400 people attended the December concert in Walnut Creek. Brahms' Requiem, performed by the Chorale with original poetry read by students from the Martin Luther King Jr. Freedom Center was deeply meaningful and provided insight into the challenges facing our young people. Our Stand Up! concert in May, with Nova and a showcase of three elementary after-school choirs, provided such a wonderful way to close the concert season. Young people finding their voices, showing their courage and spreading their joy will always stay with me. Julie and Conway did exemplary work putting


together a two-week summer camp in June. Over 50 children experienced the joy of choral music, most for the first time!

We served over 2,450 children in FY 21-22 even with the protocols and issues surrounding the pandemic. Our staff and Teaching Artists were resilient and adaptive. We brought quality, equitable music programs to the children of Oakland—not to mention the joy of singing!

I have been deeply touched by the welcome that I have received from our singers, donors, funders and staff. The strength of any organization is the people who comprise it. We are truly blessed with a dedicated, caring and committed group of people who believe in our mission and work to achieve our goals.

Our financial outlook is strong and our growth in both adult and children's programs is significant. We finished the fiscal year in a positive position and with gains in our reserve fund. This is due to your generosity and support. Thank you!

Our 2021-22 season was very special for all of us on the performing end as we returned to live performances after a 20-month hiatus. The Chorale was able to perform three diverse concerts, including a unique performance of Brahms' Requiem in collaboration with youth from the Martin Luther King Jr. Freedom Center in Oakland. We once again collaborated with Nova and selected singers from our children's choirs both in December and May, singing alongside one another and offering each other support that displayed our mutual respect and enthusiasm. When David Morales founded Cantare in 1987, he built it around a powerful mission. Decades later, that mission is as strong and relevant as ever-but relatively unknown beyond our singers and select audiences.

> In 2020, David and Board President Graham Seel recognized that, to grow and sustain Cantare's positive impact, they needed an actionable, differentiating brand positioning that would help tell Cantare's story, guide operations and grow community engagement and support.

That fall we embarked on a brand refresh that included stakeholder interviews and visioning sessions. The complete alignment of stakeholders and staff was remarkable and made the work ahead fun.

Brand Designer Chris Lauer joined the effort in summer 2021, translating the

learnings into a new brand identity system. This included a vivid new color palette and a contemporary, vibrant logo and tagline—"lifting voices, uplifting lives"—that instantly expressed Cantare's vision and energy. Chris then refreshed Cantare's website and communication templates, in time for our 2022 season.

Cantare now has a powerful, consistently recognizable platform for telling our story, inspiring others, and growing our community and impact. And through this brand refresh journey, I now have a deeper appreciation for this organization and the people who bring it to life.

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Nova Choir

Our Nova singers were thrilled to return to the stage after meeting online for 18 months. Despite the challenges of singing with masks while spaced apart, Nova gave some of its best performances ever thanks to great work by our student choreographers, who brought new energy and joy into our performances. Nova collaborated on several pieces with the adult choir and also created this music video where students shared their reflections about the importance of inclusion. Our student leadership team played an important role in motivating and organizing the group and mentoring younger singers.

Singers also worked with professional voice coaches to prepare for our annual Nova recital in March. For many students it was their first time ever performing a solo. They showed tremendous courage and gave outstanding performances, accompanied on the piano by Nova alum Mary Nguyen. Our students truly embodied the qualities they identified in September to define Nova:

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Children's Music Education

Our Teaching Artists demonstrated tremendous flexibility and creativity teaching in a year with many iterations of Covid safety protocols. Most lessons and rehearsals took place outdoors. Despite the challenges, our children thrived. In person, students learned how to sing a round in parts and enjoyed the sound of

harmony; they learned to socialize and take turns in a game, or stand confidently to perform as a group. Teaching staff saw the importance of maintaining the performance goals for our students: even though we couldn't hold large group gatherings, many of the students' performances were recorded on video and shared with the school community.

Cantare introduced a newly revamped interdisciplinary curriculum for third graders, "Around the World with Music", and in Spanish "Viajando por el Mundo con la



Música". This joins the fourth grade course "California Trailblazers: Music of California History" and fifth grade "Lift Every Voice: Music of US History", in integrating arts into culturally responsive social/history curricula, aligning with OUSD's initiative to create joyful learning environments through arts integration.

Baseline and year-end Progress Assessment

- 85% of participating students met rhythmic learning objectives
- 83% for melodic objectives
- 87% of the partner schools staff surveyed said that Cantare's Classroom Music Education helped their students develop listening and communication skills.
- 95% increase in socio-emotional/life/career skills among 6-12 graders

The academic year ended joyfully with the Cantare's Children & Youth Choirs concert. Singers from Melrose Leadership Academy and Lincoln Elementary performed in-person alongside Nova. The excitement was evident among the students and the audience and a sense of pride filled the concert like a warm embrace.

In May 2022, two of Cantare's long-time partners, Cleveland and Lincoln Elementary Schools, were honored with 2022 California Pivotal Practice Awards.



over 17%. This is largely due to reduced expenses, substantial increases in government funding and increased support from foundations and generous donors who believe in our mission. 41% of the tota income received was from foundations and govern ment programs.

The government funding was received in the form of one-time payroll tax credits (ERC), forgiveness of the Paycheck Protection Plan loan and the first installment of the National Endowment for the Art (NEA) Recovery Act grant. Additional government funding came from the California Arts Commission and our regular NEA grant.
